In & Around The Club: Sailing

Report from Olympic Trials

This February, I competed at the 2024 US Olympic Team Trials for the women's single-handed dinghy (ILCA 6). The Olympic Trials were the longest and most competitive regatta I've ever sailed in. To ensure the highest level of challengers in the Olympic Trials, candidates qualified at designated events or applied by resume. The Trials were the last part of qualification for the Olympics. Previously the US qualified to send a representative to the Olympic Games in the ILCA 6, fulfilling the country qualification. The US Olympic Team Trials were the athlete selection event, meaning the winner of the Trials would go on to compete at the Olympics as the US representative.

I qualified for the Olympic Trials by participating in the Richmond Yacht Club Olympic Class Regatta. This event was held in San Francisco, California in mid-August. The qualifying event's conditions were stereotypical



San Francisco, with all of the days blowing above 15 knots, making it one of the windiest regattas I had ever sailed in. It was a challenging event; however, I was able to finish the regatta in one of the top spots needed to qualify.

To prepare for the Olympic Trials, I used a combination of training at my yacht club, South Carolina Yacht Club in Hilton Head, and specific events chosen to improve particular areas of my sailing that I knew I needed to develop before the Olympic Trials. For part of my training plan, I attended the Orange Bowl

Regatta held in Miami in December, since it is the largest youth regatta in the US. The Orange Bowl Regatta delivered the large fleet starts and spirited competitors that I was looking for to gain practice starting on the line and holding a clear lane coming off the start. The next large event that I chose to help me prepare was ILCA 6 Youth Worlds in Mar del Plata, Argentina in January. I chose this event for the high level of competition and for the venue. Again, the event provided. With even more wind and waves than expected,

ILCA 6 Youth Worlds served to give me ocean sailing experience that made all previous conditions I had sailed in seem mild. These events were superb experiences in and of themselves and helped to prepare me for the conditions and competition I expected to encounter in Miami.

At the Olympic Trials, I was able to race against the top sailors in the US. At 17, this experience enabled me to see how I compare against my idols and what skills I need to work on to get to their level. Further, participating in this event allowed me to have Olympic Trial experience leading into the next Olympic cycle. Some of my goals leading into this regatta included improving holding my lane off the start line and getting more open water experience. The racing was eight days long with one day in the middle saved as a reserve day. The conditions at this event were varied and pushed my sailing skills to the limit. Almost all the days had a sea breeze that filled in the afternoon. Some of the days turned into

survival for me due to heavy wind and big waves as I am one of the smallest sailors in the ILCA 6 and can't keep the boat as flat as the other competitors. One of the days we had a front come through with 40+ knot puffs, and I was proud to be able to finish the race and sail at a recordbreaking speed back to the Miami Yacht Club. By the end of the regatta and especially on the lighter air days, I was able to hold my lane for longer and longer every day. Back home we don't have the opportunity to sail in such big waves, so I was thankful to have another opportunity to work on my technique in those conditions.

Coming out of the event I learned that I need to spend even more time sailing in the ocean to learn the nuances of driving over large swell. I also need to spend more time at the gym to gain the endurance and strength needed to excel in high winds. This event was an incredible experience, and I can't wait to see what the future holds as I continue to sail at such a

high level. Since the Olympic Trials, I have had the opportunity to put the skills I learned into practice. At the ILCA Gulf Coast Championships, we had big breeze every day, but I was able to put my knowledge from ocean racing at the Olympic Trials into effect. ILCA Mid-Winters West was also the Youth Worlds Qualifier and going into day three I was the top US Youth female, showing that all this training is paying off. Overall, the Olympic Trials taught me a lot about my sailing and what I need to do going forward.

I would like to thank all the people and sponsors who have guided and assisted me to get me where I am now. I would especially like to thank South Carolina Yacht Club, the Paul Miller Fund and its donors, my coach Mark Newman for the training and support, and my coach Pedro Mascarenhas for his coaching at the Olympic Trials and beyond. And of course, I would like to thank my parents for their endless support in all my sailing endeavors.


SCYC's 35th Anniversary

South Carolina Yacht Club: Looking Back Thirty Five Years by CLUB FOUNDER JAMES N. RICHARDSON, JR.

July 1, 1989 was a one of a kind evening on Hilton Head Island, Over five hundred elegant guests, dressed in Black tie, filled the Club, the promenade, and porches to experience a Club that was created to honor, South Carolina, our beloved State. Fireworks, caviar and ice sculptures were special effects of the Gala celebration. Thirty Five years ago there were less than 10,000 people living on Hilton Head Island and South Carolina Yacht Club's Opening was the talk of the Island. It was the event of the year.

It was a special time in my life as Leslie and I were married three months earlier, April 1, 1989, in Charlotte with a wedding of over five hundred guests. In a three-month time span after our wedding, we welcomed guests into our "home away from home" that we both poured our hearts into, The South Carolina Yacht Club.

When the Club opened, we



had an esteemed group of Founding and Charter Members who we honor to this day. These early members were the foundation of our Club. Leslie and I had "hard hat" dinner parties in the club every night two months before the Club opened to invite people in for a sneak peak of the Club. People fell in love with the casually elegant, boutique Club. We were fortunate so many wonderful people joined the club before she opened.

We felt using the name, South Carolina Yacht Club, required great care to live up to the State's name. We set out to create a place where the notable history of South Carolina shone through. The Catesby Dining room was named for Mark Catesby who was an explorer in the early 1700's. He was the first to conduct a critical study of the lush and varied habitat of the Southeast colonies of North America. Mark Catesby recorded the fish, flora, and

fauna. He particularly studied the environs of the South Carolina and the Georgia side of the Savannah River. His studies and hand-colored renderings showed the natural beauty of colonial America a century before Audubon. I bought Mark Catesby's entire collection of fish to display in the dining rooms and then named the dining rooms, the Catesby Dining rooms.

The South Carolina Yacht Club was an anomaly, positioned on the largest harbour on Hilton Head Island on the only locked harbour on the Intracoastal waterway. News spread and boaters and yachtsmen from around the world entered her locks to pull up to her promenade. We had members who did not own homes in South Carolina but wanted to be a part of something magical.

My family moved to the Island before the bridge, I had the privilege of learning to sail with Charles Fraser. As the South Carolina Yacht Club came together, one of my missions was to create an

opportunity for young people to experience the wind in your face that comes from sailing. After Thirty Five years, and under the direction of, Mark Newman, who has been with the Club for ten years, we have developed a program that has sent our junior sailors to Worlds and hopefully on to the Olympics. We are all very proud of our Junior Sailors, I know Charles would be.

Family and community is at the top of my priority list. Our children feel rooted on Hilton Head Island as they grew up celebrating every special occasion at South Carolina Yacht Club. For Leslie and me, creating traditions and involving our children was a basis of raising our family. The South Carolina Yacht Club wraps their arms around each member and their family. Everyone feels special when they walk in the door.

The real beauty of South Carolina Yacht Club is her "members". The Club Family is an elegant warm and

engaging group of people. Camaraderie is the peak tier of Club membership. Fellowship and community are at the heart of all the events at the Club. Our amazing Staff, under Nick Vasil's leadership, make a point to know you individually. April Langill, who has been at the Club over twenty years, even remembers anniversaries and pets' names. When you enter the South Carolina Yacht Club, our goal is for every member to feel special and at home. The members are our greatest asset. Whether you have been a member for one week or Thirty Five years, Leslie and I deeply appreciate you and hope you enjoy your Club as much as we do.

Welcome to Through The Grapevine!

In March, Wine Society experienced Wines from Washington State.

The Food and wine Pairings for Spectacular.

We started off with an amazing Karaage Style Fried Chicken, Sushi Rice Cake/Kimchi Vinaigrette that was paired with the Nine Hats Riesling.



Nine Hats was born out of the renowned Long Shadows Vintners – a winery dedicated to making world-class wines from Washington Fruit. But not every moment calls for these wines, so we set out to

make ordinary occasions special in their own right by using Long Shadows' tremendous winemaking facilities and knowledge to make a line of everyday wines. The result was delicious, approachable,

thoroughly drinkable wines at a price point that meant we could enjoy them any day of the week.

This Riesling is sourced from German clone plantings at Bacchus Vineyard and from a cool site at Gamache Vineyard.

This wine has notes of citrus, jasmine, pear, and honeydew melon combined with an appealing level of minerality and acidity to provide a fresh and lengthy finish.

Next, we had a fantastic Grilled Lamb Chop Provençale with Eggplant Caviar and Dried Currant Gastrique which was paired with a Barnard Griffin Syrah.

Robert Griffin began in 1977 as head winemaker at Preston Cellars before moving to The Hogue Cellars in 1983. While there, he began making his own wine with his wife and partner, Deborah Barnard. Barnard Griffin Winery was established in 1983 with a small truckload of borrowed fruit and a

rented cellar.

Barnard Griffin has since grown into one of Washington's most acclaimed winer-



ies, and Rob recently celebrated his 43rd vintage Washingin ton. As one of the elder statesmen of Washington wine, he holds unrivaled knowledge of region's the various terroirs. His

long-standing relationships with some of the State's best growers give him premier access to the very best grapes. Rob continues to be fully engaged in the winemaking and leadership of Barnard Griffin while ushering in the second generation of the family, passing on his wisdom and experience to Megan, his daughter and right-hand at the winery.

The Barnard Griffin Syrah displays a rich mix of tart

cherry, black currant and dark berry flavors anchored by vibrant acidity. Plush, toasty, and elegant. A great match for grilled lamb or beef

We finished the evening with a Dark Chocolate Blueberry Mousse with Mocha Crème Anglaise paired with a wonderful Cabernet Sauvignon – Betz "The Untold Story."
